The impact of Gaza War and the Closure of Main Crossings on Bakeries in Bethlehem Governorate

Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce and Industry conducted a survey to gather opinions from a sample of bakery owners, including 15 out of the 46 bakeries in the governorate, representing 32.6% of the total sample.

The table below represents the average daily flour consumption before and after the war on Gaza, the percentage of decrease in daily consumption, and the duration of inventory availability.

The table above shows a significant decrease in daily flour production, particularly for "bread," representing 58.2% of the total decrease. This reduction is attributed to several factors mentioned by bakery owners, including:

- 1. Inability to distribute to cities and neighboring areas outside Bethlehem, such as Hebron, Ramallah, and Jericho.
- 2. Decline in incoming and local tourism to Bethlehem, where there was a reliance on distribution to hotels within the governorate.
- 3. Negative impact on consumption due to repeated school closures and the shift from physical to online education.





- 4. A Decrease in Daily Consumption by consumers within the governorate.
- 5. Limitation of production to once a day.
